Our teaching, from the basics, has been focused on getting good grades and job offers, rather than being creative and unique.

2. In the 21stcentury, the pure academic type of education is slowly paving way for a whole new type. The paradigm shift in the whole education system is evident. People have now come to understand that education is a 360 degree activity that should focus on students' overall development, rather than restricting him/her to the classroom.

3. Co-curricular activities that take place outside the classroom but reinforce or supplement classroom curriculum, in some way, have become a point of focus today. These activities help in the growth of the child, in more than one way. Participating in such activities helps youngsters grow mentally, socially and individually. Intellectual development of a student is developed in the classroom, but for the aesthetic development such as team- building, character- building, and physical growth, students must step out into the outside world. For instance, if a student is a part of school football team, he/ she will learn team- work and coordination, in a practical manner, which cannot be taught in the class.

4. Similarly, in colleges and institutions, there is a need for practical exposure so that the students can experience the actual working of an industry. For example, taking a student to a manufacturing firm will give him/ her the real insight and better learning of the industry. Catering to this change, most professional colleges including B-schools, have started providing practical exposure to students through regular guest lectures, industrial visits, conferences, seminars, cultural festivals, and so on. With industry visits, students are able to better identify their prospective areas of work in the overall organizational function. Moreover, they help enhance interpersonal skills and communication techniques. In addition, guest lectures are equally important for

all – round development of students. It is a great way for students to gain maximum exposure, as guest speakers talk about their real- life experiences and not what is there in the text books.	
5. Through such events, students are made to participate and coordinate different events wherein, they get to know how exactly things are managed. Classroom teaching provides the foundation, and co-curricular or extra- curricular activities provide practical exposure and opportunities to implement what students learn in the classroom. This helps in developing the overall personality of the students, inculcating various soft – skills in them, which otherwise are difficult to teach. 	While artificial intelligence can be useful in scanning and organizing documents pertaining to a case, it cannot perform higher-level tasks such as sharp decision-making, relationship-building with valuable clients and writing legal briefs, advising clients, and appearing in court. These are over and above the realm of computerization.	
	The smooth proceeding of a case is not possible without sound legal research. While presenting cases lawyers need to assimilate information in the form of legal research by referring to a number of relevant cases to find those that will favour their client's motion. Lawyers are even required to thoroughly know the opposing stand and supporting legal arguments they can expect to prepare a watertight defense strategy. AI, software that operates on natural language enables electronic discovery of information relevant to a case, contract reviews, and automation generation of legal documents.	
	Al utilizes big-data analytics which enables visualization of case data. It also allows for creation of a map of the cases which were cited in previous cases and their resulting verdicts, as per the website Towards Data Science. The probability of a positive outcome of a case can be predicted by leveraging predictive analytics with

Spread across six states from Jammu and Kashmir in the west through Himachal Pradesh, Uttarakhand, Sikkim and West Bengal's Darjeeling to Arunachal Pradesh in the far east the Indian Himalayas are divided into two biogeographic zones- the Trans-Himalaya and the Himalaya, based on physiographic, climatic and eco-biological attributes. The entire region, spread over 3.95 lakh square kilometre is home to 280 species of mammals and 940 species of birds. The Central Himalayas are the most rich in faunal diversity with 14,183 species, followed by the West Himalayas which is home to 12,022 species.
- 3. Dr. Kailash Chandra, Director of ZSI, one of the authors of the publication, said no other geographic region in the country is as unique and influences the ecology and bio- geography of the country as the Indian Himalayas. According to Dr Chandra, 85 taxonomic experts and specialists of various groups of faunal groups actively collaborated and contributed more than 50 chapters on the organisms, their habitats and the threats facing them.
- 4. Measuring the range of species spread over the biotic provinces of the vast Indian Himalayan land mass, the authors and to identify areas for future research. Dr Chandra said the fauna of the region exhibited and intermingling of both the Oriental and Ethiopian elements. He explained that the eastern parts of the Indian Himalayas, a biodiversity hotspot, had tropical elements with their affinities from Indo Chinese region. The fauna of the western part of the Indian Himalayas on the other hand, comprises the Mediterranean elements.
- 5. The Indian Himalayas also have 131 protected areas, which cover 9.6% of the entire protected area of the country, almost the same as Western Ghats, another biodiversity hotspot in the country. The protected area include 20 national parks, 71 like wildlife sanctuaries, five tiger reserves and seven Ramsar Wetland sites.

- 6. The publication lists 133 vertebrate species of the region cited as threatened in the IUCN Red List. This includes 43 species of mammals like the critically endangered Pygmy Hog, the Namdapha flying squirrel and the endangered Snow leopard, the Red Panda and the Kashmir Gray Langur. 52 species of birds are also in the threatened category like the critically endangered White Bellied Heron and Siberian Crane and vulnerable species like the Black Necked Crane and the Indian Spotted Eagle, among others. Of the 940 bird species found in the Indian Himalayas, 39 are endemic to the region. The Indian Himalayas host 1249 species or subspecies of butterflies, with the highest density recorded in the Arunachal Pradesh. Some of the rare high altitude butterflies found in the Himalayas are Ladakh banded Apollo and Red Apollo, listed under schedule 1 and schedule 2 of the Wildlife Protection Act 1972, respectively.

Britain's first taste of tea was belated – the Chinese had been drinking it for 2,000 years. The English diarist, Samuel Pepys, mentions tea in his diary entry from September 25, 1600. In 1662, when King Charles II married the Portuguese princess, Catherine of Braganza, her dowry constituted a chest of tea, and the island of Bombay for an annual lease, equivalent then to the cost of a pound of tea in England. Catherine, who was used to drinking tea in the Portuguese court, had her first sip of the beverage in England in May 1662 – the month of her wedding – at Port Smouth.

British cultivators were extremely anxious to have Chinese tea and techniques brought to India. In 1788, The Royal Society of Arts began deliberating on the idea of transplanting saplings from China. Then in 1824, Tea saplings were discovered in Assam by Robert Bruce and Maniram Dewan. Tea plantations later expanded across Assam and Darjeeling.

In 1853, Frazer's magazine suggested that India not China was the "natural home of the tea plant". By 1888, Indian tea exports into Britain were over 86 million pounds, exceeding China's 80 million. Erica Rappaport, author of another fascinating tea-history, A Thirst for Empire (2017), writes that in the 1890s, the virtue of Indian tea and Indian planters were eulogized in Victorian London in order to advertise China's backwardness and deceitfulness. Large volumes of adulterated Chinese tea were seized by the customs and thrown into the Thames. Advertisements such as this one, from A Pure Indian tea supply agency, flourished in Victorian London: 'Indian teas are purer. Indian teas are more aromatic. Indian teas are stronger. Indian teas are cheaper. Indian teas are more wholesome and better in every respect than Chinese teas'.

In the 1880s, Indian pedigrees of the beverage colonized London as well as Ireland, Scotland, many other parts of Europe and the United States. The Indian Tea store came up on Oxford Street in 1881, followed quickly by many replicas. Tea grown in India or Ceylon was merchandise in boxes, made of wood snaffled out of timber Forests in Dehradun, Shimla or Rangoon. It was impossible not to be seduced by tea in London, now a demystified Cleopatra cloned into hundreds and thousands of Darjeeling or Assam boxes.

Back in India, the Darjeeling Himalayan Railway, which opened in 1878, was symbiotically rooted to the growth of Indian tea. The first major experiment of the Indian Tea Association – founded in 1881 – for globalizing Indian tea began on the Indian Railways. By 1901, India had grown into a massive market for tea, and in 1903, the Tea Cess bill was passed, regulated cess on tea exports, which would then be used for tea promotion in India and globally.
